

NOTABLE BURIALS AND MONUMENTS

1. Dr. Thomas Edgar Schumpert – Founder of Schumpert Medical Center
2. Hancock Family Mausoleum – First in Greenwood, Signed Monument
3. Dr. William Dalzell – Hero of the Yellow Fever Epidemic 1873, Rector of St. Mark's Church
4. Jean Despujols - Artist noted for Paintings of French Indochina. These works depict French Indochina before the destruction of World War II and the wars that followed it.
5. Dr. Samuel Augustus Dickson – Early Mayor
6. Atkin's Family Tomb
7. John Fair Hardin – Historian
8. Confederate Monument – Donated by CSA Veteran Captain Peter Youree
9. William Daniel Townsend "Uncle Eli" – Pvt Co B 27th Louisiana Infantry C.S.A. He was one of the last seven veterans of the war and the last surviving Confederate Veteran from Louisiana.
10. Andrew Currie – Deputy Sheriff, Caddo Parish, Constable, Caddo Parish, Shreveport City Fire Chief 1881, Mayor of Shreveport 1878-1890, Louisiana State Senator 1892-1896, Postmaster 1896-1901, Shreveport City Council Member 1900-10, Owner and Operator of Shreveport Times
11. Newton Crain Blanchard – U.S. Congressman, U.S. Senator, (the 33rd Governor of Louisiana, serving 1904-08
12. John Allen – Undersecretary of State, FDR's cabinet
13. Albert Colwell Steere – Architect and Developer
14. Richard Wiliam Norton - Oilman, philanthropist, capitalist. One of the discoverers in the 1930s of the famed and highly productive Rodessa Oil Field in Northwest Louisiana. Established the fortune that allowed his widow and son to create the R.W. Norton Art Foundation and the R.W. Norton Art Gallery in Shreveport, La.
15. Daniel Price Napier - Known as the "Butterfly Man," he murdered a 15-year-old girl named Maggie Mae Giffin in Shreveport in 1934, was tried, and executed. He was the last person legally executed by hanging in Caddo Parish, La.
16. Willa Norwood – Spanish American War Nurse
17. William Wiener – Award-winning architect, William B. Wiener, along with his brother, Sam G. Wiener, pioneered the International Style of architecture. Along with Sam G., they held the distinction of being Fellows of the American Institute of Architects. The Tomb listed on the National Register of Historic Monuments.
18. Samuel Gross Wiener - Internationally-known architect and early proponent of the International Style; first president of the North Louisiana Chapter of AIA and a member of the State Board of Architectural Examiners. Signature or landmark designs include many local schools in Caddo and Bossier Parishes; B'nai Zion Temple, the Centenary Open Air Theatre, the Coca-Cola Bottling Company in Shreveport, Commercial National Bank, Confederate Memorial Medical Center/LSU Hospital in Shreveport, the Don Theatre, First Presbyterian Church in Shreveport, the Domestic Science Building and Women's Dormitory

at Grambling State University, the original terminal at Greater Shreveport Municipal Airport, the Jopco Building (Journal Publishing Company) at 315-317 Lake Street in Shreveport, Howard Motor Company Building, the Hunter Building (Silver Lake) in Shreveport, Linear Junior High School, Marjorie Lyons Playhouse at Centenary College, the Rex Theater, the Ricou-Brewster Building, Rubenstein's Department Store along with many others.

19. Bruno Strauss - A scholar of German Philology and an editor of Moses Mendelssohn letters.
20. Betha Badt Strauss - one of the first women to earn a doctoral degree in literature. She became a writer and a publisher specializing in the cultural Jewish Renaissance.
21. Col. Jerome Gilmore – Shreveport Mayor 1869, 1870-71
22. John McWilliams Ford - N.Y. Elected city alderman, 1908. Became a member of the Caddo Parish Police Jury in 1914. Elected to the state legislature in 1915. Shreveport mayor, 1916. Served as commissioner of finance, 1930-1965
23. Sam S. Caldwell - Democratic Mayor of Shreveport 1934-1946
24. Littleberry Calhoun Allen - Mayor of Shreveport, La., 1970-1978, a major figure in transitioning the city from racial tension of the 1960s to the progressive business capital of Northwest Louisiana in the 1980s.
25. City Overlook and LSU Medical School Monument to Donors of Bodies to Science
